Kloosterkerk Worldwide (KKW) funded a number of initiatives and projects in 2010 in the Makeni Ecumenical Centre run Settlement Villages of Chisamba, Kalwelwe and Mwomboshi. The support covered water development and capacity projects building initiatives.



Funding was provided for the sinking of 4 new boreholes and rehabilitating of 5 existing ones. This has eased the people's access to safe drinking water.

Cooperative Training in Management, Entrepreneurship, Conservation farming and construction of Appropriate Storage structures (see pictures above and below) featured under capacity building initiatives. All of these cost more than K100m to accomplish.

African AIDS Angels lifting vulnerable rural people from poverty

African AIDS Angels (AAA) is a Canadian charity that has been helping Makeni Ecumenical Centre in the delivery of its community services, especially the orphanage.

In the last three years, AAA has been supporting our Agriculture Settlement Project Extension Support Project (ASP-ESP) which involves distribution of inputs and extension services to very vulnerable families. There were 35 beneficiaries.

The **ESP** produced has remarkable harvest in the 2009/2010 season. The average yield per household was 27 (15-39) bags/acre, a great increase from the previous 8-15 bags/acre. Each family is expected to have at least 15 bags for sale. In preparation for the 2010/2011 season, all the beneficiaries have managed to obtain part of their inputs from sales of their maize crop. It is expected that they will double their and consequently sizes production by April 2011 if the season is favourable.

39th Graduation Ceremony

Earlier, in his welcoming address, Fr Andrew Mukuyamba, the Executive Chairman of the Centre commended the Government for providing an environment conducive for private institutions to carry out training. He bemoaned the higher fees of registration by TEVETA.
