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MEC hands over family planning equipment & tools to the UCZ

On 27th September 2013 Makeni Ecumenical Centre handed over a supply of family planning equipment and tools to the United Church of Zambia. The handover was necessary since Makeni Ecumenical Centre has been scaling down its activities in family planning since July 2012.

The equipment and tools at the static clinic were not considered of much

further use. The static clinic was part of the original family planning project that MEC initiated in the early 1970s to serve Makeni and Lusaka based clients. It provided further support with weekly visits by a gynaecologist.

Cooperation between Makeni Ecumenical Centre and the United Church of Zambia dates back to the time our agricultural settlement project began in 1971. The first twenty families of settlers that were trained and supported by MEC were settled on UCZ land in Kafue.

The Executive Chairman of Makeni Ecumenical Centre, Fr Andrew Mukuyamba, presented the tools on behalf of MEC. The items were received by Rev. Lubinda Sitali, the Synod Health Secretary. Rev. Sitali thanked MEC for the gesture and stated that the items will be used fully. He further asked the management to feel free to share some of its challenges and UCZ would always extend its hand where possible. This in return would help in strengthening the relationship that has existed for a long period of time between MEC and UCZ.

MEC's family planning project began scaling down its operations because the government opened a number of public health facilities in rural sites that MEC was servicing and strengthened provision at local clinic level in Makeni.

The 2012-13 academic year provided Makeni Ecumenical Centre with a rare opportunity in the skills training program due to our partnership with the Campaign for Female Education (CAMFED) to educate eighteen female students in Food Production and General Agriculture.

The students enrolled at MEC were from across the country, mainly from the rural parts of Zambia. There were ten students in Food Production and eight in General Agriculture, respectively.

A few weeks before the students graduated the editorial team had an opportunity to interview them. The girls had positive feelings about the courses they did and were grateful to CAMFED, MEC management, training staff and their families for the opportunity rendered and support. In fact, some of them have been employed already, while some had been promised employment from where they undertook their industrial attachment. They all passed the TEVETA examinations.

Mother of seven goes back to school

"I must learn to read and write so that I am not looked down upon", were the words of Felistus Mwale when she was visited by the editorial team to hear her story, in Mwomboshi.



Felistus Mwale (in uniform above) is a married mother of seven children. She joined the Settlement Project when she was 24 and the mother of four children. Her case was typically humanitarian because she did not qualify to be admitted for settlement training, due to her young age. However, a decision was made by the selection panel in early 2000 to consider her as an exceptional case.

Contrary to the views that she would not stay in the settlement village, she has proved otherwise and even achieved election to the Village Management Committee as Vice Secretary. It was during her time as Vice Secretary that she decided to go back to school to overcome her difficulties in writing and keeping records. In 2010 she enrolled in Grade 6 and wrote and passed her Grade 7 examinations in 2011.

She is currently doing her Grade 9 and wrote her final examination in November 2013 at Mwemba Basic School in Mwomboshi. She rents a small hut near the school and every weekend travels back to her farm in the Settlement Village. We wish her the best.
