Christmas Holidays

It is hard to believe that the year has almost ended. The children have written their final exams and on the 6th of December they went home for the Christmas holidays.

In accordance with the wishes of our local Department of Social Welfare, it is good for the children to reconnect with their home environment, however humble it may be. Where the home is thought to be unsafe, children go to stay with a relative. Some will go to rural areas, where they have relatives, but most will go to urban compounds, which can be quite a challenge.

Wherever they go it will be very different from the strict regime of an institution. Holidays mean that they do not have to get up at 5 in the morning to tidy their beds, eat their breakfast and get ready for school. But in holidays it can also mean that perhaps they will have no bed of their own or no breakfast.

When children return after holidays, they are often a bit thinner and some will bring with them a bag full of dirty laundry which they were unable to wash because they had no water or no soap powder. Even in the urban compound they would have had to walk a distance to get water from a communal pump. When they return, they are appreciative of the electricity and water that they have at the Centre, even if the electricity is only occasional, as it is at the moment.

The School Bus

In May we received a school bus as a gift from the Busy Lizzies, Friends of Flanders and it has proved a tremendous advantage. Every day it is filled to capacity by MEC school children, but the St Nicholas children who live within the confines of MEC had so far never been able to enjoy a ride on the bus. At last the opportunity came, when they when they went home for school holidays. Very exciting!



The School

The School has done very well this year. Firstly, the headmaster Mr Longwani, has added a touch of stability and improved discipline in the school in general.

No teachers left our employment during 2019, despite the temptation of better pay at other schools. Our school is registered as a government examination centre, which is quite an achievement. To qualify as an examination centre it is necessary to have three laboratories and also computer facilities.

Many schools in the vicinity now use our school for writing their grade 7, 9 and 12 examinations. The enrolment of pupils has also increased, possibly because of the school bus, and also because of a new sense of stability in our teacher population.

In the new year we will be able to give the exact figures of pupil enrolment and the pass rate in the national examinations.

Schoolwork

This year we had five children from St Nicholas who were writing national government examinations.

In Grade 7 we had Esther Njonvu, Pexilida Hanyimba and Anna Tembo; in Grade 9 Basil Tembo and in Grade 12 Adam Lengwe.





We have spoken to the children often about the importance of education and we remind them constantly of how fortunate they are to have sponsors for their education and a safe environment to study, work and play.

We hope and pray that the school holidays will be a time to help reinforce these concepts in their minds and that they will return to us ready to work and study seriously in the new year.

Planting

Before leaving for the holidays the children prepared a field and planted maize seed. We hope and pray for adequate rains to maintain the plants, which will be part of the food supply for the St Nicholas Orphanage.

Generator

Friends of Flanders and Archbishop Shane Jantzen of Victoria, Canada are sharing the cost of a very large Generator for MEC. This will greatly assist our work, since for almost 2 months we have had no electricity for up to 18 hours a day. The power is usually available for just 6 hours, from midnight to 6 am — most unsatisfactory for productivity! We are praying most earnestly for a good rainy season to replenish our lakes, dams, rivers and underground water supplies. The current drought may be the worst for twenty or more years. This has brought the <u>Victoria Falls</u> into the news recently, and the country's reliance on hydro-electric power has been hit by low water levels here and at the <u>Kariba Dam</u> amongst other places.

Boys' and Girls' Brigades

On the 25th August the boys had a renewing of the boys' brigade vows, while the girls had theirs on the 29th September. In attendance were many dignitaries of the girls' and boys' brigade and brass bands from local neighbouring churches. At both boys' and girls' renewal there were St Nicholas children participating in the ceremonies.





Friends of Makeni

We are most grateful to Friends of Makeni who covered the cost of repairing the Computer Laboratory after a disastrous fire in the poultry section also caused major damage to the laboratory. Happily, with the donation we were able to restore the laboratory to its former good state.

The sale is in aid of the work of Makeni Ecumenical Centre and St Nicholas Orphanage.

Mr Sandy Adam from Scotland is a regular welcome visitor. He came for three months and worked in the MEC Main Office allowing hard-working Miss Tina Nkhata to go on Leave. We are most grateful for his contribution to our work.

Mrs Joke Ruiters from Friends of Makeni in Holland came in February and was with us for five weeks. Joke is also a regular visitor who is much loved by the St Nicholas Children.
